

Greene Lamp Program in Beaufort

Greene Lamp Community Action of Kinston, NC was awarded a \$1.7million WIOA Disaster Grant by the Eastern Carolina Workforce Development Board (ECWDB). The purpose of the grant is to provide employment opportunities to displaced workers and the long-term unemployed in disaster recovery jobs in the nine (9) counties the ECWDB serves (Carteret, Craven, Duplin, Greene, Jones, Lenoir, Onslow, Pamlico and Wayne) Greene Lamp is currently hiring up to 130 people for shortterm (1 year or less) job opportunities to work with public agencies (towns, cities, counties) and non-profits (performing humanitarian aid work) as part of the disaster recovery. To qualify potential applicants must have either lost their job as a direct result of Hurricane Florence, been long term unemployed (minimum of 13 weeks) or they must have been recently laid off from a prior job. Additionally, any employers in need of additional help due to inconvenience from the storm may apply to be a potential work site. The grant provides free labor for the employers so long as they provide disaster related work for the participants."


asts! Discover the art of the New Deal era through the nationally treasured murals of Simka Simkhovitch,
