The Board of Commissioners met Oct. 23 and Nov. 13 for their regularly scheduled monthly meetings. They took the following actions and heard the following presentations:

- No action was taken by the BOC during the October work session. The following items were discussed: Mayor's Conservation Program, a Town Facilities Naming Policy, September financial notes, and the Town Manager's Report. A presentation was made on local dredging efforts and future financial planning through the Town's Financial Advisors (First Tryon).
- Martin & Starnes presented the FY 2023 Audit.
- Approved the meeting minutes of Oct. 9, 2023 and Oct. 23, 2023 were approved, as well as a Capital Project Budget Ordinance for the Professional Park Drive Area Stormwater Project.
- Authorized an offer to purchase submitted by the owners of the Inlet Inn (601 Front Street). The agreement noted an offer to purchase the property from the Town for the sum of







Duke Marine Lab Community Science Initiative (CSI) was a part of the Town of Beaufort's "Art in the Park" event that happened Nov. 8 at Louis Randolph Johnson Jr. Park. Duke CSI and Dr.



Rachel Noble of UNC Institute of Marine Sciences brought under-

graduate students to engage with the public and educate them on our Adopt-a-Drain program. There were also various art activities where kids could do fish prints, color with chalk, or play storm hole (a storm drain themed version of corn hole) all while the East Carteret High School Art Society painted a drain mural to raise awareness on storm drain pollution. There was a great turnout, and it was wonderful to see people of all



ages engaging with art and having fun together. Duke and UNC are excit-

ed to participate in more Beaufort events in the future. Mayor Sharon Harker said, when asked about the drain mural, "I absolutely love it, I think it's great when we get our young people involved and our community. And doing it through art is a great way to express themselves, so I really appreciate them bringing their talents out here. Adopting a drain is a wonderful program, it really is, and I can't wait to adopt more drains. I just think it's absolutely beautiful and fits in with Beaufort. We're learning a whole lot about



marine debris and the impact it has on our envi-


