Beaufort, the Gateway to Freedom

As we enter Black History Month, it is important that we recognize Beaufort's long and rich African-American history. Carteret County native and accomplished North Carolina historian David Cecelski wrote in his book *The Waterman's Song, Slavery and Freedom in Maritime North Carolina* that early in the Civil War, free slaves helped Union soldiers navigate boats in the middle of the night from Morehead City, under the cannons of Fort Macon, through the shallows, and to our shores as Union soldiers occupied Beaufort without a shot fired. Because Beaufort fell so early in the war, Beaufort became a Gateway to Freedom...the second largest free slave community in North Carolina, with James City (outside of New Bern) as the largest. This is an important part of our Town's history and I hope we all continue to strive to make Beaufort a community that is free from discrimination of any form.

Congratulations to the Beaufort Garden Club

My heartiest congratulations to the Beaufort Garden Club as they celebrate their 60th anniversary. These ladies are one of our most active volunteer groups with beautification projects throughout our community to include the Boys and Girls Club, Town Hall, the old library, and the Boardwalk. The Beaufort Garden Club is a key to keeping Beaufort the "#1 Small Town in the South." Well done!

Update on Infrastructure and Parks

Paving. In March, we are expecting to secure funding for paving of 3 miles of our streets. With this funding, we will send out a Request for Proposal to determine the contractor to conduct this extensive work. We expect this paving to start no later than this fall (weather permitting) and should progress relatively quickly. As a reminder, we will not repave any streets that require underground utility work. That underground work is much more complex and will occur over the next few years.

Cedar Street. NC Department of Transportation will dramatically improve Cedar Street before turning it over to Beaufort. This work will include rehabilitating storm water systems that have collapsed over the decades. The State budget impasse has significantly slowed this work but so far it remains funded. We do not have an estimate for the start or completion of this project. Randolph Johnson Park. I recently attended a meeting with contractors that have been selected to completely refurbish Randolph Johnson Park. They are motivated to get to work and have recently received a Notice to Proceed (NTP) from Town Engineer Greg Meshaw. The NTP will give the contractors 150 days to substantially complete this important project. We're hoping it will be complete much earlier than 150 days, but it is "better done right, than fast." We greatly appreciate the generous benefactor who is making this extensive park upgrade possible.

Topsail Marine Park. We had intended to start work (with the help of the Beaufort Garden Club) to improve Topsail Marine Park on the south end of Orange Street. Due to the recent fire adjacent to the park, we are delaying this Topsail Marine Park project until demolition work is complete in this area.

2020 Small Vessel/Kayak Lottery

The 2020 Small Vessel/Kayak Lottery for storage at a waterfront Town park will be 1 p.m. Wednesday, March 4 at the Train Depot. The lottery will be live streamed on the Town of Beaufort's Facebook



page. Spaces will be assigned in order of the lottery. You do not need to be present. Town Staff will assign a space as close to your listed preference as is available that meets the needs of your vessel.

There are 3 dinghy, 4 canoe and 37 kayak spaces at Fisherman's Park. There are 12 kayak spaces at Gray-

den Paul Park and 12 kayak spaces at Curtis Perry Park. Payment and valid proof of residency must be received by the Town of Beaufort within 10 business days of the lottery in order for your space to continue to be reserved. The 2020 fee is \$75.

Town Staff will be at the Train Depot to accept payments in the form of cash and check during the lottery on March 4.

Historic Preservation Commission

The Historic Preservation Commission met Jan. 7 and discussed the following items:

- Approved: 519 Front St.- Request to install new 20-sq. ft. attached sign, add fiber cement siding to the lower outside granite wall and paint the area a light gray.
- Tabled until February meeting for additional information: 208 Cedar & 319 Orange St.- Request for demolition of two existing structures, tree removal with replacement with other vegetation, installation of lighting for the parking area and

fencing for the perimeter of the parking lot and adjacent properties. • Staff has preliminarily selected a firm to update the existing Historic District Guidelines, pending State Historic approval. If all goes well a community input session will be held in early March with another session later in the summer. The completion of the guidelines will be beneficial for future construction and reconstruction in the Local Historic District.
