Black History Month Starts with You

During Black History Month 2023, let us remember the way forward starts with each individual. One person can change the course of history. Let's continue celebrating and remembering Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. during the month of February as there is work to do. Let's remember King not simply to reflect on the life and work of a great man who led a movement that moved this nation forward exponentially; not only to remember Dr. King and the civil rights movement that fought against segregation, poverty, and war; not just to memorialize a man of God who was killed 55 years ago at the young age of 38 for what he stood for. Those are all excellent reasons to celebrate Dr. King, but the real reason is that the work that began in the civil rights movements of the 1950s and 1960s is not yet done. We still have disparities in educational

achievement, health care, housing, poverty levels, and job and business opportunities.

Despite the progress that has been made, we still have work to do. As long as poverty, injustice & inequality persist, none of us can truly rest. It doesn't take much to change a life. Dr. King's philosophy of nonviolent



social change still rings true today. Dr. King grew up in a segre-

Dr. King grew up in a segregated world, but King was raised to speak up against injustice. King witnessed his

father stand up against segregation and various forms of discrimination. In 1936, King's father led hundreds of African Americans in a civil rights march to the city hall in Atlanta to protest voting rights discrimination. Although King's father was an influential role model, it wasn't apparent at that time that Dr. King would grow up to lead a movement that would continue to stand up against segregation and discrimination.

Dr. King may have had doubts about his role as a leader, but it was not his nature to sit back and do nothing. To quote Dr. King, "The time is right to do what is right." A mindset we should all adopt.

King relied on his faith in God to guide him. King once stated, "Faith is taking the first step even when you don't see the whole staircase."

Let us think about that statement. We all know that it would be very difficult to decide to step out or off a staircase and not know what is next. But that is how change happens. So, don't be afraid to step when you don't see what's next.

Dr. King was not always seen as a hero during his life. Martin Luther King, JR was an agitator. He was an activist. He made "GOOD" trouble.

He was fighting the problems of what Civil Rights leader, abolitionist, and former slave Frederick Douglass called the "Color Line."

So, what is the "Color Line?" It is the line that separates people based on their color.

Leaders like Martin Luther King fought to abolish the color line, and they paid for it with their lives.

Some of you reading this will remember growing up in a segregated world. Many of us do not share that same story.

If we all shared the same story, it would mean that no progress was made.


But because of Dr. King and millions of others in the

fight for advancing civil rights for people of color in the United States through nonviolence and civil disobedience, our stories today are different.

The shift in our story and how King led the movement to create that change is why we still honor Dr. King and why he is still an inspiration to many across the world. As we witness nations around the world continue to struggle under the weight of violence, hate and poverty, today's social, political, and economic landscape reveals the need to remember Dr. King's philosophy and methodology of nonviolence.

King's legacy is remembered and honored in many ways. There are 955 street in the United States named after Martin Luther King and numerous parks. King's legacy has influenced people across the world. King's work inspired the South African leader (Albert Luthuli), who fought for racial justice in his country during

apartheid. King's legacy inspired many to get involved and be part of the change. I encourage you to ask questions, find your voice in this world and get involved in your community. Regardless of age, staying informed and giving back is essential not only for your growth, but for the growth of



our community and the world. Get involved at your level of comfort.

Many years before I thought of running for office, I served as a Girl Scout leader and on the PTO. I started where I was comfortable, but I was giving back and getting involved. I believe getting involved gave me the courage to run for office. Eventually, I was elected to serve as a commissioner for two terms, and now I am the first African American to serve as the Mayor of Beaufort. If you get involved, it will take you places you only dreamt of going.

King had a dream. In that dream, he saw what it could be. But, Dr. King did not live long enough to see the global impact of his life's work. Look what getting involved can do. You can achieve greatness and not even know it.

On Feb. 4, 1968, at the Ebenezer Baptist Church, King spoke about how he wished to be remembered after his death (which he must have felt was coming sooner than later). King stated:

"I want somebody to mention that day that Martin Luther King Jr. tried to give his life to serve others. I want somebody to say that day that Martin Luther King Jr. tried to love somebody.

I want you to be able to say that day that I did try to feed the hungry.

I want you to be able to say that day that I tried to clothe those who were naked.

And I want you to say that I tried to love and serve humanity."

I hope you will use King's legacy to inspire you to fight injustice when you see it and when you can, through nonviolence and civil disobedience, get involved, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and try to love and serve humanity.

One day your actions will have a positive impact on someone's story.

Evolve will streamline the plan review and permit process by allowing Town staff to instantly access the application, plans and their workflow dashboard (to do list) from any device with internet access. Reviews are completed simultaneously by each department instead of waiting for paper plans to be routed which will speed up the review process. Plan review comments and notifications are automated. Other notifications such as power releases to the utility company are also automated and sent at the moment the inspection is approved. The software is anticipated to "Go Live" before spring 2023.
