Happy 100th Birthday to the Beaufort Woman's Club! Twelve community-minded women gathered in a Queen Street home in January 1921 to form a community club for the betterment of Beaufort. Here are some of the club's major milestones:

1922-Started the town's first library

1932–Operated free cafeteria for grade school children during Great Depression

1957-Originated the Old Homes Tour and ran it until 1979

1972-Created the Beaufort flag and presented it to the town

1996-Raised funds to restore the 1907 Beaufort Train Depot

2010-Purchased and moved the c1726 Ward-Hancock House to Gallants Channel

2014-Provided financial assistance to restore the c1821 Purvis Chapel

2014-Started an annual Arts Competition for Carteret County students

2019-First Craftsman Style Architecture Tour that raised \$23,000 for local charities Today, with more than 100 members strong, the Beaufort Woman's Club has big plans for its centennial year, including a big community birthday bash later this year. Board of Commissioners

During the Dec. 14, 2020 regular monthly meeting, the Board of Commissioners took the following actions:

- Approved Minutes for the Oct. 26 Work Session (open and closed sessions), Nov. 4 Special Meeting, and Nov. 9, 2020 Regular Meeting.
- Approve FY 21 Budget Amendment #4.
- Approved Capital Project Street Rehabilitation and Pedestrian Improvement Budget Amendment #1.
- Approved FY 21 Budget Amendment.
- Conducted a Public Hearing on Case No. 20-11 Request to Rezone 1205 Lennoxville Road.
- Discussed Turner Street Traffic Calming
- Denied an event application from Ann Street United Methodist Church for Christmas Eve Services at Grayden Paul Park.

Historic Preservation Commission

The Town of Beaufort Historic Preservation Commission met Dec. 1 and discussed the following six items:

Case # 20-24 413 Front Street – Sandwich Board – A request for a 2' X 4' wood Sandwich Board painted white. This item was approved based on information and testimony that was given during the hearing.

Case # 20-25 119 Orange Street – Accessory Building – A request for new 1,200 square foot accessory in the rear yard of 199 Orange Street. This item was approved based on information and testimony that was given during the hearing and a condition to place a date brick was included in the approval.

Case # 20-26 301 Front Street – Landscaping & Parking – A request for new landscaping and parking area removing the asphalt pavement and using paving stones for the rear parking area for 301 Front Street. This item was approved based on information and testimony that was given during the hearing.

Case # 20-27 217 Front Street – Rear/Garage Addition – A request for new 2-story rear addition to include a garage. This item was approved based on information and testimony that was given during the hearing and a condition to place a date brick was included in the approval.

Case # 20-28 218 Front Street – Dock, Fence & Landscaping – A request Install a proposed dock, Beaufort Style Fence with Landscaping at 218 Front Street. This item was tabled and the Commission requested more information regarding the materials to be used as well as a reduction in height for the proposed Beaufort Style fence along Font Street.

Case # 20-29 400 Front Street – Attached Sign – A request for an attached sign on the Front Street and water side of 400 Front Street totaling 31 square feet (15.5 sq. ft. each sign). This item was approved based on information and testimony that was given during the hearing.

New Historic Standards – The new format is designed to be easier to read as well as the inclusion of more graphics and photos as examples. A new component of the Standards is a chapter on resiliency and elevation of structures that will be beneficial in lower portion of the district. We believe that the draft is a vast improvement over the former standards and hope you agree.

In other news:

The Inspections Division issued 43 Building Permits and completed 157 inspections for the month of November.

Also, congratulations goes out to Jeremy Ganey for passing his Electrical II exam. This is a major accomplishment as he works towards his Level III credentials.


Carteret County Schools to start New Year with Remote Learning

Carteret County Board of Education members voted Dec. 16, 2020 for all students in the school system to attend school Jan. 6 -19, 2021, via remote learning. The second semester for all students begins Jan. 6, 2021. All grade levels, prekindergarten through 12th grade, will return to school on Plan C - Remote Learning. On Tuesday, Jan. 19. 2021 elementary school students currently attending school for faceto-face instruction will resume Plan A while middle and high school students will return to Plan

The decision was based on the county's spike in COVID-19 cases after the Thanksgiving holiday and the predicted spike in cases after the winter break.

Teachers and staff members will report to their regular school/work site on Jan. 4, 2021.

Meals will be available for students during this time out of school. The dates, times and locations of meal pickup and possibly delivery will be announced no later than Jan. 5, 2021.



Chat with the Chief is an opportunity for citizens to engage with the Beaufort Police Chief Paul Burdette, Jr. to learn more about what is happening in the community, discuss neighborhood issues, identify problems, discuss police/community relations and to deepen community partnerships.

During the meeting, Chief Burdette will provide an in-depth look at data from the last quarter along with a comparison to the previous year. He will share statistics and trends as well as information on the daily operations within the Beaufort Police Department.

The site is located behind the second building right of Hwy 24. After the recycled shells are collected and cured, the federation works with partners to return them to the water where they provide new habitat for fish and shellfish.
