COVID-19. I really had hoped that we would be far enough along in recovery that we would not have

to talk about the pandemic in this month's newsletter, but alas, we still have concerns. Throughout the pandemic, Dr. Rachel Noble from UNC has been collecting samples at the Beaufort Wastewater Treatment site to detect spikes in COVID-19 cases. During a two-week period in June, Dr. Noble's team identified increased concentrations of the virus. This may very well be associated with an increase in visitors but fortunately we have not seen a proportional increase in positive cases at the County Health Department and Carteret Health Care Hospital. The results of the sampling should be a reminder that we are not done with the pandemic yet.

# **Planning Board**

The Planning Board met June 21, 2021 and discussed the following items:

Case # 21-11 Site Plan - Front Street Village - Transportation Center- Request to construct a 16,500 sq. ft. Transportation Center as approved as part of the original PUD approval in 2008. Elevation drawings for the center were approved in 2014 and were included as attachments in this proposal. Recommended approval with a 3-2 vote and requested the name be changed to a Transportation, Storage & Office Facility.

Case # 21-12 Preliminary Plat - Front Street Village - Phase IV-Request to subdivide a 10.44 acre tract into 34 Single-Family Residential lots. Unanimously recommended approval.

Case # 21-18 RZ 100 Fairview & 1310 Live Oak - B-1 to TCA - Request by The Cullipher Group, on behalf of Beaufort Properties - NM, LLC to rezone 100 Fairview Drive and 1310 Live Oak Street from B-1 General Business

to TCA Townhomes, Condominiums and Apartments. Unanimously recommended approval.

Case # 21-19 Final Plat- Palmetto Plantation @ OBV Phase 2 – Request to subdivide a 1.11 Acre Tract into 4 Lots Single-Family lots. Unanimously recommended approval.

Case # 21-20 Final Plat - Live Oak Commons - Request to subdivide a 1.28 acre tract into 8 single-family lots. Recommended approval with a 4-1 vote.

In other planning news: The Inspections Division issued 62 Building Permits and completed 263 inspections for the month of May. From July 2020 to May 2021 there were 693 building permits issued and 2,187 inspections completed.

# **Summer Reading Program**

"Summer slide is the loss of academic skills when school is not in session." Mason said. "It is largely attributed to a lack of reading during the summer months and this is critical since the effects of summer slide are cumulative. Libraries work hard to provide summer initiatives around reading."

"We are really fortunate to have such a supportive community," Taylor said. "The unique thing about the auction this year, is that all the proceeds will be going to our Old Jail restoration project. It's a very extensive and expensive project, but well worth it!"

The Old Jail c. 1829 is the second oldest jail in North Carolina, second to the Edenton jail built in 1825. For 125 years it remained the active jail for Carteret County. After talk of its demolition in the early 1960s, local commissioners and the newly formed Beaufort Historical Association knew it was worth saving.

In 1977 the Old Jail made the journey from Courthouse Square to the grounds of the Beaufort Historic Site. Since then, it has welcomed over 60,000 visitors, school groups, and daily tourists every year. The Association started their recent restoration of the jail at the end of 2020. It will focus on restoring the structural integrity of the jail and is set to conclude in the fall.
