

The 2022 Pay to Park Season began Monday, May 23, 2022 and runs through 5 p.m. Monday, Sept. 5, 2022. Parking




rates are \$1/hour between 8 a.m.-5 p.m. except in the West/East parking lots which are at an escalating rate starting at \$1/hour.

Beaufort Business Association (BBA) News





Plastic Free By the Sea Less waste, more resources, more

in your wallet •Turn the tap off when brushing

•Turn the tap off when brushing your teeth. On average, 4-8 gallons of water is wasted every day by leaving the water running while brushing your teeth. That's 1,460



to 2,920 gallons a year. Turning off the tap while brushing will also

help your wallet.

·Use the dishwasher and scrape off food scraps instead of rinsing dishes before loading them. Up to 27 gallons of water per load is used when washing by hand versus as little as 3 gallons with an energy-saving dishwasher.

·Wash your clothes in cold water. About 90% of the energy it takes to run a washer comes from heating the water. Unless you're dealing with oily stains, washing in cold water generally does a good cleaning job. Even just switching the setting from hot to warm cuts energy use in half.

·Spend less time in the shower. We spend on average about 8 minutes in the shower. A standard showerhead uses about 2 gallons of water per minute. That means we use about 16 gallons of water each time we shower. Cutting your shower time by just one minute could save 60 gallons of water per month. You'll be conserving water, reducing the CO2 caused by heating the water, and cutting down your water bill.

·Use dryer balls instead of softener/dryer sheets. They are reusable and unlike dryer sheets, don't contain toxins. You'll be lowering both landfill waste and toxins while saving yourself money.

Rather than buying plastic or glass bottles or cartons of juice, purchase frozen concentrate from the frozen food isle. Simply mix the concentrate with water in a pitcher. Less packaging will be produced and then discarded, many more concentrate cans fit into your (reusable, hopefully!) shopping bags, and they take up less storage space in your home than bottles or cartons when stocking up.
