At a Glance: Our First 90-Days

The first 90-days in office have flown by but your elected officials have hit the ground running. In March, the Mayor and Board of Commissioners will attend a board retreat to discuss budget priorities, economic development, housing, infrastructure, and future growth.

During the transition period your officials went to work:

- We met with department heads to better understand the town's priorities and needs and to review the budget.
- We reviewed current infrastructure and other town projects.
- We took a tour of town facilities to assess future needs.
- The Mayor and newly elected and appointed officials completed their ethics training ahead of schedule, and we have been engaging and available for community input.

As the transition period continues, the board will continue to tackle important issues, be transparent, and collaborate with our citizens and community partners to build a brighter future for Beaufort.

Golf Cart Registration & Ordinance Updates

The Town of Beaufort has made some minor changes to the golf cart ordinance. These changes update the Registration and Permit Requirements (Sec. 73.04) and the Standards of Operation (Sec. 73.05) sections.

- Effective immediately, the Town of Beaufort will begin to enforce the annual golf cart registration and inspection requirement as required by the ordi-
- Your golf cart registration will only be valid during the calendar year in which it is issued, Jan 1st until Dec 31st.
- Once an owner registers their golf cart and pays the \$75 annual registration fee, they will be issued a new, updated registration plate and/or a yearly decal to affix to the top right corner of their issued registration plate.
- Both are required to be displayed on the rear of the golf cart while in operation.

Understanding this is a new change, the Town of Beaufort will extend a grace period for golf cart owners who have not yet registered their golf carts for 2022. This grace period will last until May 1, 2022 in order to allow owners sufficient time to register.

The changes that were amended on the Standards of Operation address the driving age and area of operation.

- Operators must now be at least 16 years old and possess a valid license.
- Golf carts may now be operated on West Beaufort Road, the 100-300 block of Live Oak Street and the 100-400 block of Turner Street.
- The Town has also added the required passenger restraint requirements. When transporting a child less than 8 years of age, a child passenger restraint system must be used.

Beaufort Garden Club Public Art Sculpture to be Dedicated March 4, 2022

Carteret County has a maritime heritage like few places in America,



and in Beaufort, the history of menhaden fishing spanned well over 100 years. From 1865-2005, when the last fish processing plant

closed for good, in Beaufort and surrounding environs, menhaden fishing, and all that it entailed, was king. The associated odors of fish and the fish factories were thought of by locals as "the smell of money."

To celebrate and reinforce the culture and history of menhaden fishing and what it meant to the local community, the Beaufort Garden Club, which has worked to beautify Beaufort since 1959, created a Public Art Committee to select, purchase, and install a sculpture for Topsail Park. Located on Front Street at the end of Orange Street, the park, also home to the Middle Passage Port Marker, is an honored place of remembrance and beauty on the Beaufort waterfront.

After a regional search for artists, Morehead City artist Kirk Parker Davis, who was the sculptor for the signature sculpture at Carteret General Hospital, was chosen by the Garden Club for his design entitled "Menhaden Melody." His vision for the piece is the swirl of a menhaden ball as fish cluster in their familiar tightly packed schools, which often number in the thousands, or even the hundreds of thousands of fish.

The sculpture, which is rendered in metal, is ten feet tall, supported on a four-foot concrete base. The height of the sculpture will make it visible to boats entering Taylor's Creek as they come into Beaufort by water, or to pedestrians as they walk down to the foot of Orange Street. The base of the sculpture will highlight six panels offering archival photos of menhaden fishermen and fishing vessels, as well as descriptions written by local authors. The major donor for the sculpture is the family of long time Beaufort waterman Allen Henley Woodard.

The dedication ceremony for "Menhaden Melody" will take place on Friday, March 4, at 5:30 p.m. in Topsail Park, followed by a public reception in the NC Maritime Museum auditorium. Both events are free and open to the public. In addition, on Saturday, March 5, the Maritime Museum is hosting a symposium on menhaden traditions called "The Smell of Money: The Legacy of the Menhaden Fishery." Admission is free but seats are limited to 75 participants, so RSVPs are encouraged and can be reserved on the website of the Maritime Museum. To complete a weekend of all things menhaden, on Sunday, March 6, the Core Sound Museum will host an afternoon program at their museum on Harkers Island. "The Mosquito Fleet of Davis Shore: Menhaden Fishing Down East" will begin at 2:30 p.m. It is free and open to the public.


Volunteer Opportunities

Protect Your Property -Build Responsibly

If your property is in the Special Flood Hazard Area (AE, A, or VE zones), it is subject to the floodplain development standards outlined in the Town of Beaufort Flood Damage Prevention Ordinance, including a 1-foot free-board.

What is freeboard? Freeboard is elevating a building's lowest floor above predicted flood elevations by an additional height to increase safety.

What are the benefits of freeboard? There are many reasons why including freeboard is beneficial beyond improving safety. Adding elevation to a new construction is a cost-effective decision, as it typi-

cally adds little cost, but results in greatly reduced flood insurance premiums and flood damages. The structure will also be better prepared for ongoing sea level rise, intensifying storms, and tidal flooding. Remember, the Town requires 1 foot of freeboard, but you can always add more to protect your property!
