



Planning Board

The Planning Board met on Feb. 14 and discussed the following

- •Preliminary Plat Re-Approval-Request for the re-approval for Beau Coast Phase II-The proposed phase contains 61.85 acres to be divided into 137 lots with over 20 acres of dedicated open space. Recommended for Approval.
- Special Use Permit-Utility Facility-Request from Duke Energy Progress for a Special Use Permit to construct a substation on undeveloped property (Parcel Id # 730704606612000) off NC Highway 101. Recommended for Approval.
- Preliminary Plat-Request from CGW for the subdivision of a 4.13 acre undeveloped tract to be divided into two separate parcels. The property is located at 1798 Live Oak Street. Recommended for Approval.
- •Final Plat-Request from CGW for the Final Plat subdivision of a 4.13 acre undeveloped tract to be divided into two separate parcels. The property is located at 1798 Live Oak Street. The owner is posting a bond in the amount of \$24,650 to install sidewalks. Recommended for Approval.

Code Enforcement Corner—Unlawful Deposits

Town Ordinance Section 50.35 specifically addresses unlawful deposits. "No person shall throw, drop or deposit, or cause to be thrown, dropped, deposited, on any land in the town (vacant or occupied, including specifically streets, alleys, sidewalks, gutters, ditches, drainage canals, or other public and/or semi-public areas or in all waters under the jurisdiction of the town and other public and other semipublic areas or in all waters under jurisdiction of the town) any waste including but not limited to refuse, garbage, ashes, rubbish, dead animals or fish, paper, drinking cups, broken glass, tacks, brush, grass, weeds and anything injurious to health."

That's a mouthful. Basically in a nutshell, it is unlawful for someone to deposit any type of debris onto any land that is not your own or otherwise designated for such deposits. Another example is cleaning paint brushes in a drainage ditch that discharge into public trust waters. Violations of this ordinance is a misdemeanor for each consecutive day of occurrence.



Additionally, the Public Works may clean up the rubbish and/or material from the site and collect the cost of the removal from the property owner.

Fats, Oils & Greases

Many overflows, or SSO's, are caused by the accumulations of fats, oils, and greases (FOG) in the wastewater collection system. While the collection system is designed to handle and safely transport sanitary waste to the wastewater treatment plant, too much FOG placed into the system can cause clogs and result in an overflow, especially after high flow events such as heavy rains. Dumping fats and oils derived from animal and vegetable sources, including meats, nuts, cereals. and beans, down any drain, in either a home or business, can



cause a stoppage that forces raw, untreated waste to spill into our yards, streets, and streams. The Town has adopted a sanitary sewer ordinance in an attempt to reduce the frequency of grease-related overflows.



2019 Small Vessel/ Kayak Lottery

The 2019 Small Vessel/Kayak Lottery for storage at a water-front Town park will be at 1 p.m. Wednesday, March 6 at the Train Depot. The lottery will be live streamed on the Town of Beaufort's Facebook page.



Spaces will be assigned in order of the lottery. You do not need to be present. Town

Staff will assign a space as close to your listed preference as is available that meets the needs of your vessel.

There are 3 dinghy, 4 canoe and 37 kayak spaces at Fisherman's Park. There are 12 kayak spaces at Grayden Paul Park and 12 kay-

ak spaces at Curtis Perry Park. Payment and valid proof of residency must be received by the Town of Beaufort within 10 business days of the lottery in order for your space to continue to be reserved. The 2019 fee is \$75. Town Staff will be at the Train Depot to accept payments in the form of cash and check during the lottery on March 6. Please fill out and return your completed 2019 Small Vessel Application by 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 5, 2019.
