Signs are regulated by the Town in the interest of safeguarding the public, preventing adverse community appearance, and preventing over use of signs. The Town has fielded many calls from concerned citizens about the 40' protest signage found throughout the corporate limits. According to the Town's Land Development Ordinance Chapter 16, the signs within the Town's Right-of-way are prohibited. Furthermore, North Carolina General Statute 136-32 specifically defines sign placement in accordance with the following: No sign shall be permitted in the right-ofway of a fully controlled access highway.

No sign shall be higher than 42 inches above the edge of the pavement of the road.

No sign shall be larger than 864 square

No sign shall obscure or replace another

sign.

Political Signs

Election season is upon us and with that comes a plethora of campaign signs. We often field calls from concerned citizens about election/political sign regulations. North Carolina General Statute 136-32 defines compliant political signs as being permitted "during the period beginning on the 30th day before the beginning date of "one-stop" early voting under G.S. 163A-1300 and ending on the 10th day after the primary or election day, persons may place political signs in the right-of-way of the State highway system as provided in this section. Signs must be placed in compliance with subsection (d) of this section and must be removed by the end of the period prescribed in this subsection." Subsection (d) states, "The permittee must obtain the permission of any property owner of a residence, business, or religious institution fronting the right-of-way where a sign would be erected. Signs must be placed in accordance with the following: No sign shall be permitted in the right-ofway of a fully controlled access highway. No sign shall be closer than three feet from partment (252) 728-2142.

Subsection 16(N) of the Town's Land Development Ordinance (LDO) prohibits sign placement on Town property and its Rightof-Way. Furthermore, subsection 16(E) lists the following additional restrictions: Political/Election signs are limited to 4ft2 Signs must be removed within 3 days following the certification of the election or conclusion of the campaign, whichever is

Fee-Parking space locations (includes golf cart-only spaces):

- On-street spaces on Front Street from Queen Street to Moore Street, 4 hour
- •On-street spaces from Live Oak Street to Queen Street, all-day
- •Front Street parking lots (East and West), all-day - escalating rates
- · Queen Street parking lot, all-day
- ·Craven Street parking lot, all-day •100 block of Turner Street, 4 hour
- •100 block of Craven Street to Middle Lane, 4 hour limit
- Pollock Street in front of Town Hall (6 spaces), 4 hour limit

Q: Is there a charge for handicap parking?

A: No. All handicap spaces are free. Vehicles with valid handicap placards may park in any space and not pay a fee.

O: Can I pay by coin?

A: Yes. The machines accept coins and credit card. You can also use the Pay by Phone App. Ambassadors have change.

Q: Why Paid Parking?

A: To meet the parking demands of residents, visitors and merchants in the Waterfront Business District by managing the limited resource of public parking spaces through the use of seasonal fees and providing a mixture of all-day spaces and four-hour spaces to ensure adequate turnover.

Q: Where does the money go?

A: Revenue from fees is used to pay the costs of managing the parking program. Net revenues are used for beautification and infrastructure projects in the Waterfront Business District.

Q: Is there still free parking in Beaufort?

A: Yes. There are still many unmetered parking places within several blocks of Front Street

O: Will I need to move my vehicle after 4-hours?

A: If you are parked in a 4-hour spot, you will need to move.

Q: Can I pay at any of the pay stations?

A: Yes, you will need to remember your space number.

Crystal Coast Triathlon—Volunteers Needed

The Crystal Coast Full and Half Booty Triathlon is Sunday, May 12, 2019. Please be on the look out for athletes throughout the day on May 12. There will be several road closures throughout the county. Expect delays along the race route. The full route may be found online at www.crvstalcoasttri.com.

This not-for-profit race has two events:

TRIATHLON

The Full Booty triathlon is a 2.4 mile swim, 112 mile bike, and a 26.2 mile run.

The Half Booty triathlon is a 1.2 mile swim, 56 mile bike,

and 13.1 mile run.

Both races start at 7am, and the event

ends at midnight. The Crystal Coast Triathlon is a 100% non-profit race, meaning no members of the Board of Directors or the Race Director are paid for their work. Additionally, 100% of profits go to local charities such as the Friends of the NC

Maritime Museum and the Beaufort Boys & Girls Club. Our goals are to put on a first-class triathlon at the Crystal Coast and raise money for worthy charities. We are also eager to introduce our beautiful Crystal Coast to the world of endurance triathletes and their family members and friends.

An event of this magnitude cannot happen without many volunteers! People are needed in different capacities including handing bib and packet pick up the day before the race at the Race Expo, directing and assisting athletes in the transition area, directing participants on the race courses, manning water stations along the bike course (Beaufort, Morehead City, Newport, and Havelock) and run course (Beaufort), and providing finish line support such as handing out medals, mylar blankets, water and food. Please consider helping with this exciting and inspirational event.

We are looking for individuals as well as groups such as high school clubs, Boy Scout troops, Church youth groups, and Running and Cycling clubs. Volunteers work in shifts of 3 to 5 hours. No prior experience is necessary. We will provide instructions for all volunteers and a volunteer coordinator will be available for questions before and during the event. Note that youth/high school groups need an adult contact person.
