More recently, faculty and students from the UNC Institute of Marine Sciences have been conducting field work in Town Creek and Gallants Channel to measure toxins in those areas. Dr Rachel Noble, Dr Johanna Rosman, Dr Nathan Hall and UNC-IMS undergraduate students are helping us determine the level of contaminants so we can work together to identify sources and (more importantly) mitigate or eliminate those sources.

Next, to reduce black water and gray water pollution, we have started the conversation with local marinas to ensure boat owners are pumping out at the marinas and not opening their heads in our waterways. Finally, I have heard from numerous citizens about the need to reduce marine debris in our coastal ecosystem. This is a significant problem and will require all citizens, businesses, and visitors to embrace a culture where it is no longer permissible to dispose of cigarette butts, plastic bags, Styrofoam cups, aluminum cans, or any other trash on our sidewalks, in our streets, or in our waterways.

How did Hurricane Florence affect you? Please join and let us know your experience!

On Nov. 13 and 19 from 6-8 p.m. at the Beaufort Train Depot, there will be community nights to document your experiences during Hurricane Florence. We are interested in learning about how people in Eastern Carteret County got access to specific types of resources (information, physical labor, emergency supplies, etc.) that helped with hurricane preparation (before) and recovery (after). What resources were easily accessed (and from who) and what resources were difficult to access (and why)?

We are collecting this information in a research partnership with SeaGrant, Duke University, the Town of Beaufort, and the Core Sound Museum & Heritage Center to understand community networks and their role in disaster preparedness and response. Through this work, we hope to inform plans for future hurricane planning and preparedness. Light refreshments will be available.

Board of Commissioners

During their Oct. 14, 2019 regular monthly meeting, the Board of Commissioners took the following actions:

- Approved the minutes of the Sept. 9, 2019 regular meeting.
- Approved the Designation of Applicant's Agent for Hazard Mitigation Grant Program.
- Approved moving the November meeting to Monday, Nov. 18.
- Approved an amendment to the Navigable Waters Ordinance.
- Appointed Peter Crumley and Liz DeMattia to serve three year terms on the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

Planning Board

The Planning Board met On September 30th and forwarded the following cases to the Board of Commissioners.

- Case No. 19-19 Site Plan Compass Hotel The Planning Board recommended approval of the plan on a 3 to 2 vote while adding two conditions and four recommendations for the Board of Commissioners to consider when they consider it at their November meeting.
- Case No. 19-20_RZ R-8 to TCA Beaufort Village Condominiums After conducting a public hearing the Planning Board voted 4 to 0 to NOT recommend approval in that the proposed zoning is not consistent with the CAMA Future Land Use Map.
- Case No. 19-21 RZ R-8 to B-1 Lennoxville Rd After conducting a public hearing the Planning Board voted 4 to 0 to recommend approval in that the proposed zoning is consistent with the CAMA Future Land Use Map and adjacent land uses.
- Case No. 19-22 ZTA Micro Distillery After conducting a public hearing the Planning Board voted 4 to 0 to recommend approval of the proposed text amendment to allow Micro Distilleries as a Special Use.

Historic Preservation Commission

The Town of Beaufort Historic Preservation Commission met on Oct. 1 and ruled on the following items:

- Case # 19-20 612 Broad Street Exterior Renovations to the former Police Department to include new siding, windows, doors and paint. Approved as presented.
- Case # 19-21 Queen Street Driveway A request to install new driveway pavers. Tabled until the November meeting due to applicant not being in attendance.
- The State Historic Preservation Office is reviewing the documents for the Town to begin the development of new Historic District Design Guidelines. .


