# Transparency, Accountability, and Process in Beaufort

During my tenure as Mayor, the Town Staff and Board of Commissioners (BOC) have insisted on **transparency**, **accountability**, **and process** during our deliberations. As we have seen with the recent Jim Dandy and Shackleford Landing initiatives, transparency can be a bit messy because there are a lot of details, opinions, and facts to consider. Prior to a final decision, the Town Staff analyzes the authorities for projects and provides comprehensive background information to the BOC. Our Beaufort commissioners have been great about doing their homework in advance of deliberations, and working toward a decision. After the final BOC decision, you may not agree with the results but it is my goal that, from start to finish, there has been transparency, accountability, and process. And I will assure you that during these BOC deliberations, we will maintain civility.

I've recently had citizens ask my opinion about the greatest threats to Beaufort:

- Climate change. The effects of climate change are driving sea level rise, and increasing air and sea surface temperatures. As a result, we are clearly seeing an increase in the frequency and ferocity of storms, and increasing rain events that threaten our town.
- **Degraded water quality.** The quality of our waterways is degrading due to numerous sources that include storm water run-off, black water/gray water, failed septic systems, agricultural run-off, and marine debris. I am particularly worried about the Newport River Estuary that is already heavily stressed, and will be further stressed by the dramatic increase in residents and visitors anticipated after the completion of I-42.
- Good 'Ol Boy politics. Transparency, accountability, and process negate Good 'Ol Boy politics where deals are made behind the scenes, and the needs of the Good 'Ol Boys are prioritized over the needs of all citizens. For the health and prosperity of our community, we must continue to prevent Good 'Ol Boy politics in Beaufort.

# **Planning Board**

The Planning Board met Oct. 18, 2021 via zoom and discussed the following items: Case # 21-22 Rezoning from B-1 & R-20 to PUD Shackleford Landing-Request by Stewart Inc., on behalf of Beltway Investment Group, LLC to rezone 86.08 acres as a Planned Unit Development to include 400 residential units plus commercial space. The request also includes a list of requested variations and a Master Plan

Waterfront Master Plan The Town of Beaufort is preparing a master plan for its downtown waterfront with the goal of ensuring continued access, use, and betterment of this important community asset. Once complete, the Plan will serve as comprehensive guide for future in-water and landside capital and operational improvement. Critical in the plan making process is learning about issues and priorities from Town residents and users. How can the waterfront be improved for all? What types of amenities are needed? What should be prioritized? These and other questions are paramount in shaping a plan that is fully reflective of the brand and values of Beaufort.

## Fats, Oils & Greases

Many overflows, or SSO's, are caused by the accumulations of fats, oils, and greases (FOG) in the wastewater collection system. While the collection system is designed to handle and safely transport sanitary waste to the wastewater treatment plant, too much FOG placed into the system can cause clogs and result in an overflow, especially after high flow events such as heavy rains.

Dumping fats and oils derived from animal and vegetable sources, including meats, nuts, cereals, and beans, down any drain, in either a home or business, can cause a stoppage that forces raw, untreated waste to spill into our yards, streets, and streams. The Town has adopted a sanitary sewer ordinance in an attempt to reduce the frequency of grease-related overflows.


# Historic Preservation Commission

The Town of Beaufort Historic Preservation Commission met Oct. 5, 2021 and discussed the following items:

Case # 21-35 608 Broad St: Exterior Renovation and accessory Structure-Request from Robbin & Jennifer Rodewigg to complete the exterior of 608 Broad Street and add a rear garage. In April, the Commission approved the partial demo of the structure and required the applicant to resubmit once the demolition was complete. Approved

Case # 21-36 313 Ann St: Screened Porch & Roof - Request from Ian & Tracy Huckabee to convert a garage to a screened

porch with a metal roof. Project is located in the rear of the property in an existing footprint of the former garage. Approved. Case # 21-37 111 Moore St.: New Construction-Request from Danny Allen to construct a 1,726 sq. ft. new single-family dwelling. In September of 2020 the property received a Variance from the Board of Adjustment which allowed for reduced setbacks for the front and rear. Approved. Case # 21-38 509 Front St: Privacy Fence- Request from Harborside Suites, Sam Williams, to install a privacy fence in the rear of the property that can be seen from public view. Approved. # The Old Beaufort Post Office Papers

I first met Iustin Wallace when he was in the lobby of the old Beaufort Post office, now the Beaufort Visitor Information Center for Cape Lookout National Seashore.

He had brought in some younger family members to show them their former postal box number 252. It had belonged to his Grandfather, Claud Johnson of North River. He owned CJ Trucking and drove trucks at Open Grounds Farms. Like most business owners, Mr. Johnson had a PO Box in Beaufort. Justin would ride with his Grandfather in his "loud old white truck" when he was six years

old in 1996 and could easily remember the box number since it was 252, the same as the telephone area code. Justin's Grandfather would lift him up to reach the box and he would stick the key in, get if open and sometimes slam it shut again which was just great fun for a six-year-old. And the best part of getting the mail was afterwards there was a huge gumball machine in the lobby and getting a piece of gum made his day complete.
