Beaufort, Adversity, and Generosity

Adversity certainly brings out the best in Beaufort. After our second strong hurricane in less than a year, our Town Staff, citizens, business leaders, churches, schools, non-profits, and civic groups immediately rose to the occasion and I saw numerous examples of neighbors helping neighbors. But this spirit of cooperation extends well outside of Beaufort town limits. In eastern Carteret County, we are inter-connected as friends, family, co-workers, and classmates. We are independent, strong, and co-equal communities, and we help each other when the need arises.

Even on the periphery of Carteret County, our selfless spirit is a force for good. On the weekend of September 20-22, Beaufort hosted 75 6th-12th Grade students (and chaperones) from Ocracoke



whose homes, businesses, and schools had been devastated by storm surge associated with Hurricane Dorian. Ann St United Methodist Church served breakfast, and the students visited the Olde Beaufort Farmers Market, Beaufort Historic Site, and the NC Maritime Museum. They had dinner from Clawson's, a pizza party at Beaufort Middle School (provided by Crossroads Pizza), and ice cream at the Beaufort Hotel.

But the generosity extended well outside of Beaufort. The students stayed at Camp Albemarle, the Big Rock Blue Marlin Tournament contributed \$18,400, and a Facebook fundraiser provided another \$6,100. They also visited the NC

Aquarium at Pine Knoll Shores, Battle Works Laser Tag, Fort Macon State Park, and Lost Treasure Golf

Lennoxville Road Boat Ramp Temporarily Closed

BEAUFORT -- The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission's Beaufort Boating Access Area on Lennoxville Rd. is temporarily closed due to parking lot and surrounding area upgrades. After recognizing the importance of reducing the amount of stormwater runoff from the site, the Commission partnered with the NC Coastal Federation and the Town of Beaufort to replace the compacted gravel parking spaces with Ecoraster pervious paving grids.

The drive aisles will also be paved as part of the project, but most of the runoff will flow into the permeable parking stalls. Instead of hitting the compacted gravel ground, the rain will now soak into the pavers, reducing the volume of polluted runoff reaching Taylors Creek.

"The N.C. Wildlife Resources Commission strives to constantly improve and renovate our boating access areas to maintain one of the top boating programs in the nation. Our partnership with the federation on this project allowed us to go even further with this parking renovation and add these stormwater improvements to further benefit Taylors Creek. We are looking forward to boaters being able to enjoy the finished product soon," said Commission Engineering Section Chief, Gary Gardner.

"This is a good thing for Taylors Creek," said Beaufort Town Manager, John Day. "We've been looking forward to breaking ground on this project for some time. We were adamant about making the ramp upgrades as environmentally friendly as possible and are thrilled with this partnership to make a great project."

Not only will the parking lot be modified but in addition. existing green spaces and stormwater devices will be enhanced to capture more runoff. "The current gravel lot actually produces very silty runoff due to the years of compaction. This project will improve a very heavily used water access point. It's really a win-win for everyone," said Coastal Specialist with the federation, Bree Charron.

The federation was able to match Commission funds with grant funds from the N.C. Clean Water Management Trust Fund to ensure the permeable paving components of the project could move forward. The Town of Beaufort is also working to secure additional funds to hopefully add more permeable areas on the site.

Decreasing the volume of runoff to its surrounding water bodies is a key goal of the Town's Watershed Restoration Plan that was approved by the state in 2017. "It is really great to see joint resources going toward implementation of the Beaufort Watershed Restoration Plan. The Town has really embraced the plan and its strategies to reduce runoff in Beaufort," said the federation's Deputy Director, Lauren Kolodij, who helped work on the plan.

Construction at the Lennoxville Rd. site is scheduled to be complete by the end of November.

All prized for their period collections and furnishings, the homes of history run the gamut from the rustic Leffers Cottage c.1778 and the elaborately furnished Victorian Josiah Bell House c.1825, to the

award-winning restoration of the Federal-style John C. Manson House c.1825. The historic buildings include the Carteret County Jail c.1829, the Apothecary Shop and Doctor's Office c.1857 containing priceless pharmaceutical and medicinal artifacts used in early Beaufort, and the Carteret County Courthouse of 1796, which is the only remaining wood-framed English Circuit courthouse left intact in North Carolina. Each building depicts a different period or aspect of life in historic Beaufort. The Historic Buildings Tour includes three of the buildings given by experienced docents in period dress.
